Roberta Moniz Chew was born in Oakland and now lives in Union City. Their Indian tribe is *Amah Mutsun*. Her whole family was active in the tribe. They meet and do their tribal songs and dances.



Jose Gonzales was born in Santa Rosa, California and now lives in Union City. Their Indian tribe is Yurok. His father Ricardo Gonzales is Mexican and his mother Christian Hill is Native American Indian. Their tribe meets and does their dances and songs.

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Filipinos in Alvarado

The story of Filipino Independence is fragmented with war and conquest among the disparate ethnicities in the island nation archipelago. The first to come were the Spanish who brought their religion and their architecture to the nation in the 1500s and ruled with an iron fist. In 1898, Spain ceded the islands to the U.S. in the Treaty of Paris as a result of the Spanish American War. In 1935 the Philippine Islands were granted Commonwealth status by the U.S. with the aim of eventual independence for the Islands. But this was interrupted by World War II and the overrunning of the Islands by Japanese military forces.

During the war to liberate the Philippines from Japanese occupation, Filipino nationals fought bravely alongside the American boys in the effort to free the Islands. The final effort to push the Japanese from the Islands, which was led by General Douglas MacArthur, was followed closely by people in the states. The American people admired MacArthur and the Filipinos who fought bravely with him.

Just two days prior to Pearl Harbor, the Luneta Social Club of Alvarado was formed and applied to the Secretary of State for articles of incorporation as a non-profit sharing, non-stock organization. Named as directors (all from Alvarado) were: Mac Armenio, Romaldo Cabales, Pedro Gonzales, Luciano Bernardo, Felix Diangson, Alfred Siason, Joe Tobang, Pacifico Timiman, Dissdao Cawaling, Alvino Manilary, Librado Tobang and Pacifico Yerro. The society was formed "to promote the general welfare of members of the Filipino race through education, economics and athletics; and to further Justice in cooperation with organizations local to the town of Alvarado."

The Filipino community in Washington Township at this time was fewer than 90 persons, 53 of which lived in the town of Alvarado. Their accomplishments in Alvarado during the war far outweighed their numbers. The Filipino community in Alvarado, led by Felix and Domenica Diangson, worked alongside Alvarado citizens in raising money for War Bonds and the War Chest Drive.

That the small town of Alvarado would become the center of Filipino activity in Alameda County is quite remarkable. What is equally as remarkable is the enthusiasm the citizens and merchants of Alvarado showed in their willingness to share their Independence Day celebration with the Filipinos of Alameda and Contra Costa County who had chosen to celebrate their freedom from the Japanese occupation on July 4, 1946 in Alvarado. Here is that story:

I found that three persons were active in the Eden-Washington Township area during the war years that were concerned with the Filipino well being. One was Frank Bolima, Mt. Eden farmer, who was president of the NE Alameda & Contra Costa Counties Filipino Association. Frank was not only a member of the association but he also looked out for the welfare of local Filipino residents.

Another person, also from Mt. Eden, was Alex Biete who was also concerned with Filipino welfare during the war. As early as October 1941, Alex had received permission from the Board of Supervisors to hold dances at the I.D.E.S. Hall in Alvarado.

The third was Felix & Domenica Diangson from Alvarado, who were members of the NE Alameda & Contra Costa Counties Filipino Association and probably had a profound influence on bringing the celebration to Alvarado.

But it was still a pleasant surprise to the people of Alvarado that the Filipino Association had chosen Alvarado to hold their Fourth of July celebration day with the citizens of Alvarado.

In the next newsletter I will share the events that led to planning and execution of the U.S./Filipino joint Independence Day celebration in Alvarado on July 4, 1946.

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UNION CITY, CALIFORNIA 94587 CHRONOLOGY OF EVENTS: 1970-1977

1970 - Town & Country Shopping Center opened on Whipple Rd.

1970 - Opposition grew to \$8.5 million school bond because of housing issue.

1970 - Bond failed to draw 50% of support.

1970 - City Manager Job Geoghegan resigned.

1970 - City Clerk Bill Newton named temporary replacement.

1970 - 5-way race began for two (2) council seats.

1970 - Leo Alvelais re-elected, Don Miller won seat.

1970 - Kitayama failed after 11 years on council.

1970 - Council appointed Kitayama and Marshall Stone to Planning Commission, removed Dan Lopes.

1970 - Federal judge rejected SASSO appeal, but they threaten bringing the referendum before Supreme Court.

1970 - Sharon Rosal was chosen Maid of Union City.

1970 - Logan students marched on Pacific States Steel, which then installed \$2 million bag machine ending pollution.

1970 - Second school bond, this one for \$5.1 million: Jr. High received majority, but not by 2/3 vote.

1970 - In temporary suspension, Bank of America opened Union City Office.

1970 - Bill Newton resigned City Manager post; to be replaced by William Zaner.

1971 - Kennedy Community Center was built.



Myrla Raymundo, MBA Founder/Chief Executive Officer **1971** (July 13) - The Union City Women's Club started on July 13, 1971, with Mrs. James Gallagher as the President. The club operated from 1971 through 1992.

1972 - Union City BART (Bay Area Rapid Transit) opened.

1974 - Tom Kitayama was elected Mayor in Union City's first direct mayoral election.

1974 - City Bus Service "The Flea" started.

1974 - Police Chief William Cann was shot and killed.

1974 - Centro de Servicios, headed by Jaime Jaramillo as Executive Director and serving the Latino population, was established in Decoto.

1974 - The Union City Teen Workshop was established.

1974 - Rev. David Joe Brown, Sr. was the pastor of the Brown Temple, which started in 1974. His son, Rev. Jerome Brown, Jr., followed in his footsteps.

1976 - Guy Emmanuelle was hired as the New Haven Unified School District Superintendent.

1976 - Union City's Civic Center was built.

1977 - The Holly Sugar Mill smokestack was demolished.

1977 - Pacific States Steel closed.

1977 - The Decoto Fire District (formed in 1925 as a special district with the purpose of providing fire service to a major portion of the land) was transferred to what is now part of Union City and approximately 2,700 acres of hill land east of Mission Boulevard. Since that time, incorporation of the city and various annexations by both Union City and Hayward has reduced the area of the District to 1,766 acres.
