FILIPINOS IN ALVARADO

The decision to celebrate a Filipino Independence Day on July 4, 1946, the same day as the American Independence Day, was made among the people of the Northeastern Alameda County and Contra Costa County Filipino Community. The Filipinos were celebrating their independence from the Japanese yoke and they chose July 4th to celebrate in the United States for its help in freeing the Filipino populace from Japanese tyranny.

In early June 1946, Frank Bolima of Mt. Eden, Frank Macahilas and Dalmecio Carrillo of Alvarado appeared before the Alvarado Chamber of Commerce asking that the Filipino community of Northeastern Alameda County and Contra Costa County be allowed to join with the town of Alvarado to celebrate a joint Independence Day celebration.

The Alvarado Chamber of Commerce realized the importance of cooperating with our Filipino friends and immediately set up a Chamber committee to cooperate in every way. The committee suggested that the streets in town be decorated for the event and that a parade be organized for the joint celebration. It was also suggested that a big program be planned for the afternoon including an appearance by the Mayor of Hayward, to be followed by a dance to be held at the S.D.E.S Hall on Watkins Street that evening.

Besides the prestige of hosting the Filipino's Independence Day celebration, the citizens of Alvarado also wanted to show their appreciation for the work the Filipinos did in fighting alongside our boys in the Islands, and also for the appreciation of what Filipino-Americans did on the home front in the East Bay in raising food in the fields, buying War Bonds and helping the Red Cross.

The Chamber of Commerce raised \$225 for street decorations for Alvarado. Although this figure sounds somewhat paltry today, you must remember that in 1946 you could buy a new home for \$5,200 or a new Chevy for \$1,200 (with a radio and a heater!).

As the Fourth of July drew closer and closer, the program for the joint celebration grew larger and larger. The next installment of this story will be the July 4th celebration at Alvarado in 1946!

UNION CITY, CALIFORNIA 94587 CHRONOLOGY OF EVENTS: 1978-1997

1978 - (March) Kitayama won the mayor's election.

1978 - (April) The annual golf tournament and dinner sponsored by the Union City Chamber of Commerce was held at the Sunol Valley Golf Course.

1983 - (June) Union City's *Holiday Inn*, a 180-room facility at Highway 17 and Alvarado-Niles Road, opened.

1983 - (June) A new community center and fire station complex was built at Alvarado Blvd. and New Haven Road. It is called the *Holly Community Center and Fire Station*.

1983 - (June) City of Union City Mayor Tom Kitayama's son was killed in a hang-gliding accident when his glides went out of control.

- 1984 Holly Community Center was built.
- 1984 The Alvarado Fire Station closed.
- **1984** Tom Kitayama finished as mayor.
- 1985 TRI-CED Community Recycling was founded under a pepper tree on Mission Blvd.
- **1985** Union City's First Annual *Gladiola Festival*. Bessie Borghi, mother of Frank Borghi, Jr., New Haven Unified School District Trustee for many years, graced a float as the oldest person in Union City at the first Gladiola Festival Parade. The Gladiola Festival was an annual celebration in Union City.
- 1985 Chief Kenneth Garcia retired and Chief Mike Vonada was hired.
- **1986** City Council and the community partnered to revitalize the E Street Corridor.
- **1986** Over a 9-year period, each school in the New Haven Unified School District is named a *Distinguished School* by the California Department of Education.
- **1987** Voters in New Haven Unified School District approved the first of three bonds totaling \$101 million to remodel every school in the district and to build new schools.
- **1988** (March) The *Union City Senior Citizens Association* was founded. It was active from March 1988 to December 2003.
- 1991 Tom Kitayama retired as Mayor of Union City.
- **1991** (May 20) The song "That Union City of Mine" was adopted by the City Council of Union City as the official song for Union City. It was written and produced by Steve King Stewart and Byron Allred.
- **1993** Kaiser Permanente began its outpatient medical facility in Union City, and has expanded it with a second building in 1996, and a third in 2001. It is a three-story, 138,000 square foot medical office building on 8.4 acres along Union City Blvd. It serves Union City and the outlying areas.
- 1993 Mark Green was elected Mayor of Union City.
- **1994** The City decided to merge their fire department with Fremont Fire Department because of financial difficulties.
- **1996** Neighborhood residents petitioned the City Council to remove handball courts on 10th and G Streets. City residents and Union City staff partnered to create *Fred Castro Park*.
- 1997 Extended Day Care Program began in New Haven Elementary Schools.
- **1997** In the summer of 1997, the City launched the first season of the *Farmers' Market and Concert Series*. It is held each year at the Cesar Chavez/Old Alvarado Park on Saturdays from May to November. The Farmers' Market and the concert provide venues for the entire community to enjoy and help bring businesses to the area. The concert series is held at the gazebo in the park during Farmers' Market days. They usually include 11 concerts from June to August and feature international music, jazz, blues, big band, rock and disco.
- **1997** (April 26) A park located at 10th and G Streets in the Decoto District was named after Fred Castro, who served as a Park and Recreation Commissioner for 32 years.
- **1997** Carol Dutra-Vernaci won a seat on the City Council. She is still serving the city.

Hi everyone! What are some ideas to better leverage our Museum and its artifacts to more positively influence our community? Perhaps we can start with *getting more folks to experience it*: advertising through local channels; making available an exciting Museum brochure/hand-out; maintaining a presence at various local community events throughout the year. We can also look at *more efficiently conveying our City's history through our artifacts*: making sure artifacts are properly labeled in the Museum and have clear stories associated with them; keeping the artifacts clean and well-maintained; displaying artifacts on a rotating schedule to keep things fresh over time; perhaps writing a book or even developing a mobile app to convey the facts and stories about each Museum artifact to both young and old in our community.

The ideas above are merely a small sampling of what we can possibly do to improve just one aspect of our Museum. As you can see, we've got a lot of opportunity here to build something great for our community, and we could really use your help and would love for you to be a part of it. You're always welcome here. We'll see you at the Museum!

Finally, our people's stories widen our horizons mentally, as well as socially and ethically.


We will continue to write stories about people and publish them in our newsletter and eventually in our next book.
