
UNION CITY MUSEUM WANTS YOUR MEMORIES

THE SUGAR MILL AT ALVARADO THE CALIFORNIA BEET MFG. COMPANY: 1870-1874

Ebenezer H. Dyer came to Alvarado to settle permanently in 1858. He settled near his brother's farm along with his family. In 1859 Ebenezer Dyer was elected surveyor for Alameda County. He would later be appointed as a U.S. Deputy Surveyor.

At this time in U.S. history there was intense interest in manufacturing sugar from the sugar beet. The sugar beet had been cultivated and made into sugar since the time of Napoleon I of France. Before that time almost all sugar came from sugar cane, which England held a near monopoly on because of her colonies located in

the tropics. When it was discovered that sugar could be made from beets and that beets could be grown throughout Europe (as far east as Russia) Napoleon fully backed the growth of this industry so as to break the stranglehold that Britain held on sugar production.

This was not lost on the U.S., who like the European Continent had to import almost all of their sugar. Various entrepreneurs in the U.S. tried manufacturing sugar from beets as early as 1838 without any success.

In 1852 three Englishmen came to Utah to establish a beet sugar mill with equipment they had brought with them from England. The only product that came from that mill appears to have been some substandard molasses. These were men of means so the lack of money was not the cause of their failure.

The Germania Sugar Company at Chatsworth, Illinois shipped 27,000 pounds of sugar to the Chicago market as the result of their business operations for the year 1867. They planned to grow more beets in 1868 but because of the lack of water in their area they eventually failed.

Ebenezer Dyer saw the need for sugar produced continentally as our country was young and not yet wealthy, sugar was expensive at this time and almost all had to be imported. Some cane was grown in Louisiana; but sorghum, maple syrup and honey supplied what little sweetener was available at the time other than the expensive imported sugar.

Ebenezer Dyer experimented with the sugar beet on his brother's farm (Ephraim H. Dyer) and found that the beet thrived in the Alvarado soil. He grew a large test plot and in 1868 sent samples of his beets to Fond du Lac Wisconsin where two German entrepreneurs (Bonesteel & Otto) had opened a small beet sugar mill with \$12,000 in capital. Even with their limited capital investment the two German's had attracted the attention of interested parties from various parts of the U.S. They received an offer from Philadelphia to move their factory and carry on the work where they had been marginally successful at Fond du Lac.

From Alvarado they received the sample of beets from Dyer and found the sugar content to be more than acceptable. Mr. Dyer also informed the pair that he had lined up a group of investors and had \$250,000 in capital to invest in a beet sugar mill at Alvarado.

In 1869 Bonesteel and Otto accepted the offer to come to Alvarado to begin the process of turning beets into sugar. They would also move some of the sugar making equipment from Fond du Lac to Alvarado in 1870. This was the beginning of the sugar making business at Alvarado.
